

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NORWEGIAN FINANCIAL
MECHANISM 2004-2009 ESTABLISHED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE
AGREEMENT OF 14.10.2003 BETWEEN THE KINGDOM OF NORWAY AND THE
EUROPEAN COMMUNITY ON A NORWEGIAN FINANCIAL MECHANISM FOR
THE PERIOD 2004-2009**

between

THE KINGDOM OF NORWAY,
hereinafter referred to as “Norway”

and

THE REPUBLIC OF POLAND,
hereinafter referred to as the “Beneficiary State”

together hereinafter referred to as “the Parties”,

WHEREAS the Agreement of 14 October 2003 on the participation of the Czech Republic, the Republic of Estonia, the Republic of Cyprus, the Republic of Latvia, the Republic of Lithuania, the Republic of Hungary, the Republic of Malta, the Republic of Poland, the Republic of Slovenia and the Slovak Republic in the European Economic Area (hereinafter referred to as “the EEA Enlargement Agreement”) is applicable as of 1 May 2004;

WHEREAS the Agreement of 14 October 2003 between the Kingdom of Norway and the European Community on a Norwegian Financial Mechanism for the period 2004-2009 (hereinafter referred to as “the Agreement”), establishes a financial mechanism through which Norway will contribute to the reduction of economic and social disparities in the European Economic Area (hereinafter referred to as “the Norwegian Financial Mechanism”);

WHEREAS the EEA Enlargement Agreement and the Norwegian Financial Mechanism will strengthen relations between Norway and the Republic of Poland to the mutual benefit of their peoples;

WHEREAS the enhanced co-operation between Norway and the Republic of Poland will contribute to securing a stable, peaceful and prosperous Europe, based on good governance, democratic institutions, the rule of law, respect for human rights and sustainable development;

WHEREAS the parties agree to establish a framework for cooperation in order to ensure the effective implementation of the EEA Financial Mechanism;

HAVE DECIDED to conclude the following Memorandum of Understanding (hereinafter referred to as the “MoU”):

Article 1

(Objectives)

In accordance with Article 1 of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism Agreement, Norway has established the Norwegian Financial Mechanism in order to contribute to the reduction of economic and social disparities in the European Economic Area. Accordingly, the parties to this MoU shall endeavour to select projects for funding which contribute to the achievement of that objective.

Article 2

(Legal Framework)

This MoU between Norway and the Republic of Poland shall be read in conjunction with and be subject to the conditions in the following documents, which constitute the legal framework of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism.

- The Agreement of 14 October 2003 between the Kingdom of Norway and the European Community on a Norwegian Financial Mechanism for the period 2004-2009 (hereinafter referred to as “the Agreement”),
- The Rules and Procedures for the implementation of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism (hereinafter referred to as the Rules and Procedures) and subsequent amendments thereof. The Rules and Procedures are adopted by Norway in accordance with Article 8 of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism Agreement,
- The Grant Agreements, which will be concluded between Norway and the Beneficiary State for each project.

Article 3

(Financial Framework)

1. In accordance with Article 2 of the Agreement, Norway shall make available € 567 million for the Norwegian Financial Mechanism in annual tranches of € 113,4 million over the period running from 1 May 2004 to 30 April 2009, inclusive.
2. In accordance with Article 5 of the Agreement a total of € 277.830.000 shall be made available to the Republic of Poland over the period referred to in Paragraph 1.
3. In accordance with Article 8 of the Agreement, the management costs of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism shall be covered by the amounts referred to above. Further provisions to this effect are set out in the Rules and Procedures.
4. In accordance with Article 6 of the Agreement, a review will be carried out in November 2006 and again in November 2008 with a view to reallocating any non-committed available funds for high priority projects from any Beneficiary State.

Article 4

(Roles and Responsibilities)

1. Norway shall make funds available in support of eligible projects proposed by the Republic of Poland and agreed by the Norwegian Financial Mechanism within the priority sectors listed in Article 6 of this MoU.
2. The Beneficiary State shall assure the full co-financing of projects that benefit from support from the Norwegian Financial Mechanism.
3. The Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs shall manage the Norwegian Financial Mechanism. Decisions on the granting of financial assistance from the Norwegian Financial Mechanism shall be taken by the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs.
4. The Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs shall be assisted by the “Office for the EEA Financial Mechanism and the Norwegian Financial Mechanism, (hereinafter referred to as the “FMO”). The FMO shall be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the EEA Financial Mechanism and the Norwegian Financial Mechanism, and shall serve as a contact point.
5. The Republic of Poland has authorized the Ministry of Economy and Labour to act on its behalf as its National Focal Point. It shall have the overall responsibility for the management of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism’s activities in the Republic of Poland, including the overall responsibility for financial control and audit, and serve as a contact point. Its managerial setup is contained in Annex A.
6. The Ministry of Economy and Labour shall be responsible and accountable for the identification, planning, implementation and monitoring of projects as well as the use of funds under the Norwegian Financial Mechanism in accordance with the Rules and Procedures. It shall report on these activities to the FMO. Any irregularities shall be reported to the FMO without delay.
7. As a general rule and based on the nature of the project, the gathering of applications shall be carried out by open calls for proposals
8. The Ministry of Economy and Labour shall ensure that the project promoters are fully committed and equipped to ensure successful project implementation.

Article 5

(Annual Meetings and reporting)

1. In order to ensure effective implementation of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism, the Parties agree to hold annual meetings between the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Focal Point. The Focal Point shall at the meeting present an annual report, which shall amongst other things address:
 - The progress made towards the achievement of the overall objective of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism,
 - The progress of project identification in the Beneficiary State,

- The reporting of ongoing project implementation against established criteria,
 - Financial progress pertaining to commitments and disbursements,
 - Fields of intervention and measures for the following year.
2. The Ministry of Economy and Labour shall organise the meetings in cooperation with the FMO. The Commission of the European Communities may be invited to observe the meetings.
 3. Minutes of the discussions in the meeting shall be drafted by the Ministry of Economy and Labour.
 4. The first meeting shall be held no later than one year after the entry into force of this MoU.

Article 6

(Priority Sectors)

1. In accordance with Article 3 of the Agreement, grants shall be available for projects in the same sectors as under the EEA Financial Mechanism, but with priority for projects in the areas of:
 - Implementation of Schengen acquis, support of National Schengen Action Plans as well as strengthening the judiciary,
 - Environment, i. a. with emphasis on strengthening the administrative capacity to implement relevant acquis and investments in infrastructure and technology with priority given to municipal waste management,
 - Regional policy and cross-border activities,
 - Technical assistance relating to implementation of acquis communautaire.
2. Academic research may be eligible for funding in so far as it is targeted at one or more of the priority sectors.

Article 7

(Programming Framework)

1. With a view to ensuring effective use of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism funding and without prejudice to Article 6 above, particular attention will be given to the fields of intervention outlined in the programming framework listed in Annex B to this MoU.
2. Annex B shall be subject to review in the annual meetings referred to in Article 5 above.

Article 8

(Specific Forms of Grant Assistance)

1. In accordance with the Priority Sectors referred to in Article 6 and with particular attention given to the fields of intervention outlined in the Programming Framework referred to in Article 7, the parties have agreed to establish, within the overall amount referred to in Article 3, the Specific Forms of Grant Assistance listed in Annex C.
2. The Parties shall conclude Grant Agreements laying down the terms and conditions of each grant commitment.
3. Annex C shall be subject to review in the annual meetings referred to in Article 5 above.

Article 9

(Control and Access to Information)

The Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Office of the Auditor General of Norway and their representatives have the right to carry out any technical or financial mission or review they consider necessary to follow the planning, implementation and monitoring of projects as well as the use of the funds. The Republic of Poland shall provide all necessary assistance, information and documentation.

Article 10

(Coordination)

The Republic of Poland and the FMO shall closely coordinate the use of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism with the use of the EEA Financial Mechanism. All projects submitted to the mechanisms shall be consistent with the Republic of Poland's national priorities and relevant arrangements with the European Union.

Article 11

(Governing Principles)

1. The implementation of this MoU shall in all aspects be governed by the Rules and Procedures of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism and subsequent amendments thereof.
2. The Parties agree to apply the highest degree of transparency and accountability in the implementation of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism, as well as objectives and principles of good governance, sustainable development and gender equality.

Article 12

(Entry into Force)

This MoU shall enter into force on the day of signature.

The present Memorandum of Understanding is signed in two originals in the English language.

Annex A
Polish managerial set-up for the implementation of
the Norwegian Financial Mechanism

Implementation system

1. The Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs manages the Norwegian Financial Mechanism and decides on the granting of assistance.
2. The Financial Mechanism Office (FMO) is responsible for the day-to-day implementation of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism and serves as a contact point.
3. National Focal Point - the Ministry of Economy and Labour fulfils tasks of National Focal Point. The Focal Point has the overall responsibility for the management of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism's activities in Poland as described in this Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) and the Rules and Procedures adopted by the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs on 2 July 2004 and subsequent amendments, including the overall responsibility for the use of funds, financial control and audit. In particular, its responsibilities include but are not limited to the following:
 - collect proposals from all intermediate bodies and, with its reasoned opinion of the proposed projects, submit them to the Financial Mechanism Office,
 - ensure correctness of management and implementation of realised projects,
 - chair the Monitoring Committee,
 - ensure efficiency and correctness of use of available funds,
 - draw up annual reports on implementation to be forwarded for approval to the Monitoring Committee and submitted to the Financial Mechanism Office,
 - ensure a complete and sufficient audit path in all engaged institutions,
 - ensure information and publicity about available funds,
 - store all documents relating to projects realised within the Norwegian Financial Mechanism.

The role of the National Focal Point is to be further elaborated in the Grant Agreements between the Norwegian Financial Mechanism and the Beneficiary State.

4. Intermediate Body - the tasks of Intermediate Bodies have been entrusted with the ministries responsible for each priority sector (see Table 1). Under the overall management and responsibility of the Focal Point, the main tasks of the Intermediate Body are as follows:
 - call for and collect applications for projects within the priority areas from potential beneficiaries,
 - ensuring regularity of the management of projects realised within the Norwegian Financial Mechanism,
 - monitor project implementation, in particular preparation of National Focal Point periodical reports on the use of financial resources,
 - prepare applications for amendment and transfer these to the National Focal Point,
 - detect irregularities and report these to the National Focal Point,
 - inform the general public about the projects implemented under the Norwegian Financial Mechanism,
 - store all documents relating to projects realised within the Norwegian Financial Mechanism.
5. The Intermediate Body can delegate certain managerial tasks to auxiliary institutions. The Intermediate Body and auxiliary institutions will sign a legal agreement on the taking over

by auxiliary institutions of some of the managerial and implementation functions. In this case, the Intermediate Body retains its overall responsibility and is fully responsible to the National Focal Point for the efficiency and accuracy of management and implementation of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism. An auxiliary institution, responsible to the Intermediate Body, will in particular:

- call for and collect applications from final beneficiaries,
- identify eligible projects,
- conduct initial formal appraisal of submitted applications and transfer the list of selected projects to the Intermediate Bodies,
- monitor project implementation, in particular preparation of periodical monitoring reports and submit these to the Intermediate Bodies,
- detect irregularities and report these to the Intermediate Bodies,
- verify the use of funds, including in situ inspection,
- ensure that the public is informed about the projects implemented within both Financial Mechanisms,
- store all documents relating to projects realised within the Norwegian Financial Mechanism.

6. Monitoring Committee – the Ministry of the Economy and Labour will create one Monitoring Committee for the Norwegian Financial Mechanism and the EEA Financial Mechanism. The Committee is responsible to the National Focal Point for the monitoring

of project realisation within the framework of both Financial Mechanisms. The Monitoring Committee is in particular responsible for the following:

- periodically review the progress of the projects being realised,
- examine and approve the periodical reports on the use of financial resources,
- assess the efficiency and effectiveness of using financial resources available in the framework of both Mechanisms.

The Committee shall be made up of representatives of:

- the ministries involved in the implementation of funds from both Mechanisms,
- the Government Plenipotentiary for the Equal Status of Women and Men,
- social and economic partners, including employers and employee organisations,
- non-governmental institutions,
- regional and local level government.

The Chairman of the Committee invites, as observers, representatives of the Financial Mechanism Office, and, as appropriate, representatives of other institutions and organisations, whose presence could be essential to the effective implementation of the assistance provided by the Norwegian Financial Mechanism.

7. Steering Committee - all Intermediate Bodies have to appoint Steering Committees. These are tasked with identifying, collecting and recommending to the National Focal Point projects within the framework of the different priority sectors. The Steering Committees' tasks include giving an opinion and making recommendations on projects that are eligible for support within the Norwegian Financial Mechanism. In order to appropriately evaluate projects, the Steering Committee could create working groups and use the services of individual experts or other institutions. The Steering Committee will operate in an open and transparent manner.

The Committee shall be made up of representatives of:

- the Intermediate Body, depending on priority sectors,
- the Paying Authority,
- regional and local level government,
- social and economic partners.

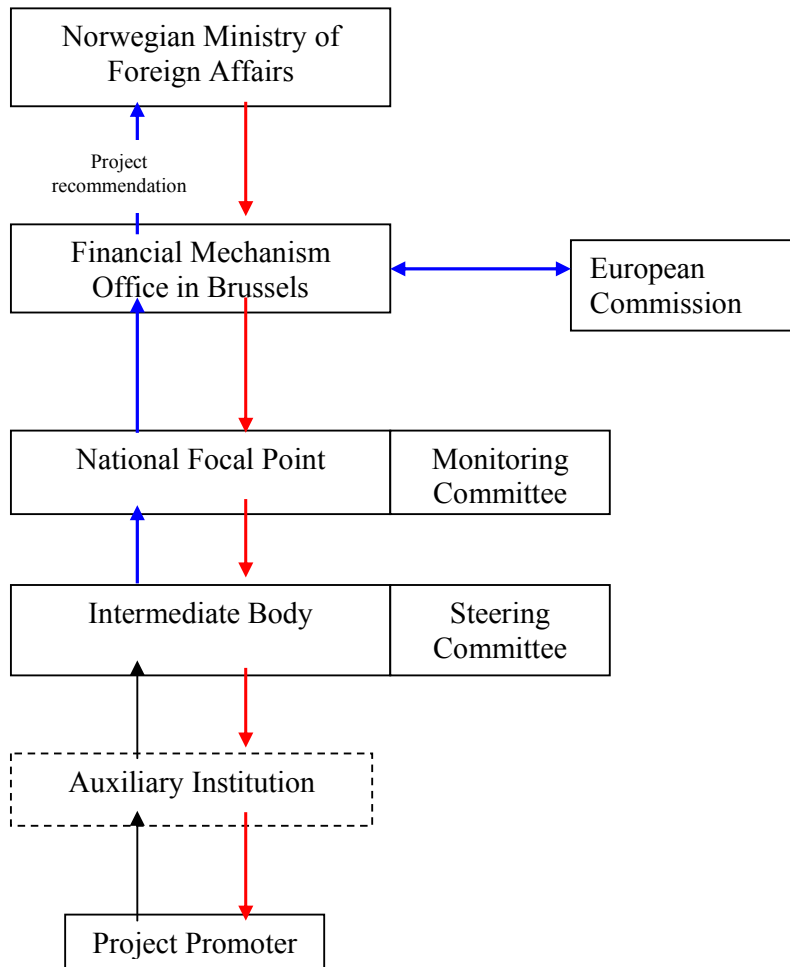
The Chairman of the Committee invites, as observers, representatives of National Focal Point, and, as appropriate, representatives from other institutions and organisations, whose presence could be essential to the effective implementation of the assistance provided by the Norwegian Financial Mechanism.




8. Paying Authority functions for both Financial Mechanisms are performed by the Ministry of Finance. Grant assistance disbursement will be made to a designated bank account at the Ministry of Finance. The tasks of the Paying Authority are in particular to:
- manage the accounts on which grants from both Mechanisms are kept,
 - certify to the Financial Mechanism Office that expenditure declarations are made on the basis of reliable and verified documents,
 - report on finance flow to the National Focal Point,
 - draw up and submit to the Financial Mechanism Office payment applications for reimbursement of the expenditures,
 - ensure that payments are made to the final beneficiaries as quickly as possible and within the specified deadlines.

Furthermore, the Paying Authority is responsible to the National Focal Point for developing, implementing and maintaining the procedures for financial management and control. The Paying Authority will verify application of these procedures by the Intermediate Body.

9. An independent body - the Bureau for International Treasury Relations in the Ministry of Finance in Poland, performs tasks of Audit Institution. It executes tasks through an organisational unit in the Ministry of Finance. Its main responsibility is to:
 - carry out audits of projects,
 - preparation of yearly audit plan and a summary of audit reports and submitting them to the National Focal Point,
 - reconcile the summary amounts certified to the FMO with the individual expenditure records and original supporting documents held at the various administrative levels and by the final beneficiaries including, where the latter are not the final recipients of funding, the bodies or firms carrying out operations,
 - verify the allocation and transfer of the available funds from both Financial Mechanisms and national funds,
 - control the regularity of eligible expenditures based on a representative sample of the operations approved,
 - ensure efficient and prompt investigation of any suspected and actual cases of fraud and irregularity and reporting these to the National Focal Point,
 - prepare yearly audit reports for the National Focal Point.

The application procedure

Information relating to the gathering of project proposals will be announced according to availability of funds and projects. As a general rule and based on the nature of the project, the collection of applications shall be carried out by open calls for proposals. These should be submitted to the Intermediate Body/Auxiliary Body, which evaluates completeness of applications and appraise them on the formal aspects. If any deficiencies or irregularities are found, applications shall be returned to the applicants for correction. Initially checked and assessed application forms shall be appraised with respect to their subject matter and technical contents by the Steering Committee, which within the appraisal procedure, awards points. The appraisal procedure results in the preparation of a list ranking eligible projects on a scale of highest to lowest score awarded. The list will be submitted to the National Focal Point as a recommendation for proposals to be submitted to the Financial Mechanism Office. Based on the recommendations of the Steering Committee the National Focal Point decides which proposals are eligible for submission to the Financial Mechanism Office (FMO) and submits such proposals to the FMO along with its reasoned opinion. According to the Rules and Procedures, the FMO makes recommendations on the proposals and submits them to the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, which makes the final decision on the co-financing of the project. On the basis of a positive decision, a grant agreement will be concluded between the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the National Focal Point.

Annex B

Within the overall framework of the priorities mentioned in Article 6 of the MOU, particular attention shall be given to the Focus Areas indicated below. The Norwegian Financial Mechanism aims to strengthen the bilateral relations between Poland and Norway.

Annex C
Specific forms of grant assistance referred to in
Article 8 of the Memorandum of Understanding

According to Article 2.2.3 of the Rules and Procedures, specific forms of grant assistance (block grants and seed money facility) may be established in addition to individual projects and programmes. Initially the following specific forms of grant assistance will be developed for final approval according to the application procedures of the Rules and Procedures.

1. Technical Assistance Fund

Measures relating to information on and promotion of the possibilities of using funds from the Norwegian/EEA Financial Mechanism, preparation of technical documentation and translation of documents and the assistance of experts and advisors

2. Funds for Non-governmental Organisations

Funds for non-governmental associations operating in all priority sectors:

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3. Scholarship and Training Funds

Scholarship and training funds to be developed within the environmental, cultural, public administration and health and childcare sectors, Schengen acquis/judiciary, self-governments and governments at regional level, as well as student exchanges between Poland and Norway and strengthening language training in the two countries.

4. Research Programme

A research programme in all the priority sectors realised in the framework of the Norwegian Financial Mechanism

5. Seed Money Facility
